Assessments (two 1500 word essays each semester plus one tutorial topic to be led by a student each semester, and written up later consisting of about 500 words).

First semester:

- (a) Select a writing from the period of the Early Church, place it in its historical context and analyse its strengths and weaknesses.
- (b) How crucial was Calvin's Institutes in the development of Reformed theology?
- (c) Pick one tutorial topic, and prepare to lead the class on it, giving context, content, and applicability.

Second semester:

- (a) Select a writing from the period of the Puritans, place it in its historical context and analyse its strengths and weaknesses.
- (b) Analyse the theology of **one** of the following: Blaise Pascal or B. B. Warfield or J. Gresham Machen or Francis Schaeffer or C. S. Lewis.
- (c) Pick one tutorial topic, and prepare to lead the class on it, giving context, content, and applicability.

Philosophy Course

Philosophy will be offered in 2024 via means for four two-day intensives:

- (a) Jan 29-30 on Ancient Philosophy;
- (b) April 8-9 on the theme of 'Know Thyself'
- (c) June 25-26 on C. S. Lewis as a philosopher;
- (d) September 9-10 on Birth and Death in Modernity.

Apart from the C. S. Lewis module, all will be led by Jemimah Wilson.
